Diocesan Growth Strategy

Bishop Gregor pledged to promote a strategy of growth for this Diocese. Anne Tomlinson, Ministry Development Officer, brings us up to date.

Bishop Gregor pledged during the Episcopal election to promote a strategy of growth for this Diocese, a strategy that would encompass the many different facets of church life needing to change and grow. Upon his election, he tasked the Dean and the Ministry Development Officer (MDO) to begin work on a process which would lead ultimately to the launch of a **Diocesan Growth Strategy** next spring.

Over the summer, Vestries, clergy and congregations across the Diocese have been working on their responses to a questionnaire which asked them to describe the life, worship and mission of their charge. Over half those questionnaires have now been returned and the Dean and the MDO are engaged in collating the responses, building up a picture of life in each Region. Those summaries will be being brought to specially convened meetings in each Region. At these gatherings the particular missional needs of each area will be discerned and also seven representatives, one from each Region, who will then form a Working Party with others from the Diocese to progress the work towards its ultimate launch in spring 2011.

VIOLENCE AND THE FAMILY

The members of Mother's Union, Glasgow & Galloway, whose vision is of a world where God's love is shown through loving, respectful and flourishing relationships are supporting and encouraging others to promote bills due to be debated at the Scottish parliament this autumn. The aim of the proposed legislation is to reduce violence in the family.

Trish Godman's Scottish bill aims to criminalise the commercialisation of sex by making it an offence to engage in paid for sexual activity and thereby act as a deterrent to traffickers, pimps and brothel owners. The hope is that legislation will be in place before 2012 and 2014 when London and Glasgow host the Olympic and Commonwealth Games which, like any other influx of people, will act as a catalyst for trafficking and prostitution. There is hope that Scotland will follow the example of Sweden in criminalising the buying of sexual services.

Rhoda Grant another Scottish member of parliament aims to improve the safety of individuals who are survivors of domestic abuse. The Bill will increase access to justice by making Legal Aid non means tested and protect individuals from stalking by removing the need for a course of conduct before a non-harassment order is granted.

The need both to support the proposed legislation and provide a prayerful response is incumbent on all who believe in the need to protect all God's people from injustice. Support for women's refuges and men in prison indicate that members walk alongside all God's people.

A caption which will form part of an exhibition highlighting domestic abuse and faith communities echoes these sentiments: - 'Domestic abuse is a fundamental failure to respect persons. Christian faith teaches us that all people are made in the image of God and so to be respected. They ought never to be reduced to mere objects of violence and desire. Faith therefore requires us to combat all forms of domestic abuse for the love of God and for the persons God loves' (Duncan 2010).

International News

Old friends and New Bishops

Communication, support and exchange of news with our friends in Byumba continue at personal and congregational levels.

The provincial Overseas Committee has been supporting theological education in Byumba, and our financial support both general and focussed, has included finance for another clergy motor bike from St. Ninian's, as well as provision for the installation of a solar panel for one of Milngavie's companion parishes.

In May, the Anglican Diocese of Byumba in partnership with Christian Aid Rwanda launched an anti-malaria community sensitization campaign at a local Health Centre. "The mission of the diocese is to care for the body as well as the soul," said Bishop Onesphore Rwaje, affirming that the church is committed to providing spiritual and health care for all. Information about some of the projects supported can be found on the Conduit Place – Friends of Byumba websites.

Kentucky like us, has recently been through an Episcopal election. Our own Bishop Idris was asked to be Chaplain to their election, and pictures of the great day are on the Kentucky Diocesan website. Unlike the Scottish Episcopal Church, the retiring Bishop, Ted, himself oversees the election and does not demit office till the new Bishop is consecrated and enthroned. Bishop elect the Very Revd Terry White, formerly Dean of the Anglican Cathedral in Kansas City, Missouri, is to be consecrated on September 25th in Louisville, we look forward to meeting him. Please remember him and his new diocese in your prayers.

Canon Joan Smith, Kentucky's Canon in Ordinary (with similar responsibilities to our Dean) attended Bishop Gregor's Consecration and had a good time in Glasgow visiting several congregations.

Discussions continue at various diocesan levels with regard to the future shape of interaction with the worldwide church and our official Overseas Companion dioceses. If you are interested in this work please contact the diocesan office to be included in the discussions. Comments opinions and suggestions are very welcome.

Racial Justice Sunday; 12th September 2010

Launch of Minority Ethnic Churches Together in Scotland (MECTIS)

A special Service to mark the work of the Churches promoting racial justice and celebrate the launching of MECTIS—the organisation which will help the new minority ethnic churches in Scotland to work together and to develop closer links with the denominations which have operated in Scotland for many years—is to be held in Wellington Church, University Avenue, Glasgow, on September 12th at 6pm.

The Service will have international and national support. It will be attended by national leaders of the major denominations in Scotland, who will extend a welcome to the leaders of MECTIS and the members of their congregations, and by Members of the Executive Committee of the World Council of Churches (WCC). The sermon is to be preached by a member of the World Council's Executive.

Brother Stephen Smyth, General Secretary of Action of Churches Together in Scotland (ACTS), said:

"The emergence of MECTIS as a body is highly significant. It provides a space for the many independent ethnic minority churches in Scotland to come together to share concerns and successes. Our hope in ACTS is, that as it grows in strength, MECTIS will provide a means by which these new churches and the established denominations can be brought into closer fellowship. ACTS is very pleased to support MECTIS and to encourage all churches in Scotland to 'Witness to Christ Today' - together."

Brother Stephen added:

"This year's Racial Justice Sunday Service will be really innovative and lively. We invite and encourage our many ecumenical friends to join ACTS, MECTIS and the WCC in Wellington Church for the event. See you there, then?"

The Service will begin at 18.00 on Sunday 12th September. Between 17.30 and 18.00 an African choir will be singing as the congregation assembles. Refreshments will be available at the close of the Service.

The Right Reverend Alan Smithson 1936 – 2010

I was appointed to All Saints Challoch in September 1995 and during the latter part of that year several visitors appeared at the Sunday service; one notable person was then the Bishop of Jarrow, +Alan because he and Jean had a 'bolt hole' in Creetown which they visited whenever time allowed.

Through the years of his visits and after his retirement, when St. Crispin's Creetown was their permanent home +Alan I got to know each other quite well. His ministry in Wigtownshire was Honorary Assistant Curate to All Saints Challoch, also Honorary Assistant Bishop in our Diocese; +Alan also performed deputising duties at all three Scottish Episcopal Churches in Wigtownshire, and when the interregnum occurred within the Church of Scotland at Minnigaff and Kirkmabreck, Creetown, +Alan was a supply minister to those church congregations as well.

In his retirement ministry he was Chairman of the Pastoral Committee to Mission to Seafarers; part of the Ministry Reflection group in the SEC for ordinands and conducted retreats. When he and Jean moved to Musselburgh four years ago his active retirement ministry continued at St. Mark's Portobello as well, also being appointed Honorary Assistant Bishop in the Edinburgh Diocese.

His hobbies were camping, painting in water colours, playing the cello, gardening, DIY and visiting people. +Alan was sadly missed in Wigtownshire when he and Jean moved to Musselburgh; he is more sadly missed now we know he will never visit Wigtownshire again and we will not hear his gentle, humble voice enlightening us of his experiences. We are all the richer for knowing the man whom God appointed to promote Our Lord's ministry and mission wherever he lived.

On Wednesday 23rd June at 11 am, the same time as +Alan's funeral service was taking place, people of the Episcopal and C of S Churches in Wigtownshire filled St. John's, Stranraer for a Eucharist of Thanksgiving for the life, work and ministry of + Alan which I conducted and during which Mrs. Marie J H Mortimer contributed the music and hymns to his memory.

Alan Smithson, Son, Brother, Husband, Father, Grandfather, Deacon, Priest, Bishop and most dear friend, may you rest in Peace and rise in Glory.
