OPEN SILENCE

ST Mary's Cathedral is to open its doors to people of all faiths and none for an hour of silence.

The Open Silence is an invitation to anyone who would like to experience spending up to an hour in stillness with others on a Sunday night.

Revd Cedric Blakey, Vice-Provost, explains: "It is an opportunity to be still and to draw breath. It aims to cultivate a knowledge of oneself and of God.

"The Open Silence is not a service; there will be no hymns, no readings, or spoken prayers. But there will be a brief introduction and short guidance that may help some to become comfortable and centre their thoughts.

"There will be opportunity for those who wish to move around to explore different styles of silent prayer in the special space that is St Mary's Cathedral. Participants will be able to sit on chairs or pews, kneel on the heated floor or even lie down.

"Christians of all denominations will be welcome, as well as those from other faith communities, and those who feel they have no faith."

Cedric added: "Some may be drawn because they are experienced in meditation, and some because they have never tried it. "Some may have been attracted by the BBC series 'The Big Silence' and would like to try meditation for themselves."

Those wishing to come to The Open Silence should arrive between 7.45pm and 8pm (though the church will be open before the service of choral evensong 6.30-7.20pm and some may value just listening to, or joining in with, that experience of musical worship). Booking is not required. There is no admission charge but a donation will be welcome to help cover the costs of this event.

The Open Silence will take place 8-9pm on three Sunday evenings: 13 March, 17 April and 15 May. Further information about silence and about prayer will be available.

Obituary: Rt Revd Derek Rawcliffe OBE

BISHOP Derek Alec Rawcliffe OBE, former Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway; passed away on 1 February at home in Leeds, aged 89 years.

Bishop Rawcliffe had remained active in ministry, and on the day of his death he read the lesson at his home church, St Aidan's, Leeds.

The Bishop of Ripon and Leeds, Rt Revd John Packer, said:

"Derek has contributed substantially in Leeds, both to our worship, through St Aidan's, and to the care of, and concern about, asylum-seekers. He has worked to help those in poverty and has also been concerned with ecumenical relationships in the city, and regularly contributed to the work of Leeds

Churches Together in Mission."

Ordained in 1944, Bishop Rawcliffe's first parish was in the Worcester diocese before he went to be a teacher in the Solomon Islands in 1947.

He was awarded the OBE in 1971. In 1975 he became the first Bishop of the New Hebrides.

He was translated to Glasgow & Galloway and served as Bishop in the diocese from 1981 until 1991, when he retired to Yorkshire.

Bishop Rawcliffe was the longest-serving Oblate of the Anglican Benedictine Community at Nashdom and Elmore Abbeys, having made his Oblation in 1947.

Young singers wanted

St Mary's Cathedral wants to recruit young singers for its highly successful choir.

As well as providing the music for regular services in the Cathedral, the choir has recorded CDs, has sung in other cathedrals (including Salisbury, Lichfield, St Mary's Edinburgh, and Tewkesbury Abbey) and is the most broadcast choir in Scotland. St Mary's has also produced a finalist for the Young Choristers of the Year Competition run by Radio 2.

Director of music Frikki Walker is looking for more boys and girls aged approximately 8-14, who possess a voice, are confident readers (of words, that is; they will be taught to read music!) and have a responsive ear. Musical potential is what is sought.

Since its inception in 2007, the junior section of the Cathedral choir (known as the trebles) has already proved to be a hugely successful training ground for young singers, with many choristers winning national singing awards and places in other choirs of national standing, such as The National Youth Choir of Scotland.

Choristers may remain members of their own church as the trebles sing only one Sunday morning and one Sunday evening service per month in the Cathedral.

Entry to the choir is by a short, informal audition. There are no costs or subscriptions. Rehearsals are on Thursdays, 5.45-8pm.

Benefits include a first-class musical training from the Cathedral's professional musicians; participation in the RSCM's *Voice for Life* award scheme, and regional and national RSCM events.

News from our Swedish partner diocese

► The Diocese of Gothenburg is to focus on baptismal life in its training and seminars during 2011. This theme will permeate conferences for deacons, priests, musicians and educators during this year.

► The Church of Sweden participated in Gothenburg Film Festival in January with seminars on specific films. It also gave an award to the documentary *Mother's Comeback*.

► A shortlist of eight candidates for bishop has resulted from the election in December. On 15 March the election will take place in the deaneries. If no candidate achieves at least 50% of the vote there will be a second round on 31 March for the two candidates with the highest poll.

► The Diocese of Gothenburg will host a consultation within the Porvoo Communion of churches at the end of March to review guidelines for meeting with people of other faiths.

► As of 1 January, the Diocese of Gothenburg consists of 196 parishes (formerly 204) and 144 team ministries. Work goes on to restructure the organisation which was designed for a church in another society and century, finding sustainable economical and administrative units and maintaining local engagement.

Free website and social networking

Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) is offering local Churches Together groups a free website and hosting, based around an easy content management system (CMS), linked to its new social networking website: **Churches Together Connect.**

A number of features help to keep content fresh and up-to-date. The website automatically takes news feeds from CTBI and ACTS; and 'plug-in' content allows local groups to quickly add details and direct links to resources available from CTBI, such as for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, Lent, Creation Time, Racial Justice Sunday and Remembrance Sunday.

The website comes with sample content but can be customised to enable local groups to add and edit their own sections and pages as required. They can upload photos and add videos too.

A banner and logo, plus a number of themes, are provided, but local groups are free to upload their own.
