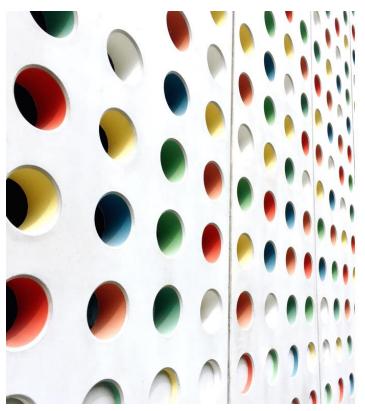
Dean Reuben's General Synod talk Item

Day to day life together 1

SCOTTISH LITURGY 1982 with Alternative Eucharistic Prayers (Revised 2021) This new edition of Scottish Liturgy 1982 incorporates changes in language both in reference to humans and to God in order to reflect the changes in English usage that have come about since 1982 and to improve on and make formal the changes to gendered language permitted since 2010.

Liturgy is one of the aspects of our life together that we share day by day and week by week. The 1982 liturgy, with the alternative eucharistic prayers has now been authorised after revision of the changes to gendered language permitted since 2010. Now all charges can be move their service booklets/texts over to this revised liturgy.

Please download this from the provincial website and see how you get on with it. There are lots of notes about the liturgical details which will help you to explore the new texts with your congregations.

Day to day life together 2

Complaints, Bullying and Time Off: the Personnel Committee brought forward proposals in relation to the adoption of a Complaints Procedure, Bullying and Harassment Policy and guidelines for holiday and time off for stipendiary clergy.

At General Synod, some important policies were presented and adopted, from the Personnel Committee.

We now have a Complaints Procedure for the entire church, addressed to people at all levels of church life.

Secondly, we have a Bullying and Harassment Policy. And all Charges are asked to make this an agenda item for their first vestry meeting after an AGM to ensure that all vestry members know about dealing with claims of Bullying and Harassment.

Thirdly, some holiday and time off guidelines were presented and adopted.



Day to day life together

The new guidance for clergy time off suggests that **two days off per week** should be the norm rather than the present one day off.

Clergy do not have contracts with e.g. entitlements or allowances of time off, but there is a need to set an expectation of the recreation and rest that a cleric should take for healthy living and wellbeing. It is up to each cleric to decide for themselves when their time off should be, but it may be helpful to discuss possibilities with others in the church as part of the process of putting this change into practice. The cleric, vestry and also the bishop may be involved.

The new guidance for clergy time off now suggests that clergy have **two days off per week**. And that that should be the norm. Rather than the previous one day off. We need to remember that clergy don't have contracts with e.g entitlements or allowances for time off, but there is a need to set an expectation for the recreation and rest of a cleric so they lead healthy lives and have a good sense of wellbeing.

Ethical Investment: the Synod adopted a framework for ethical investment in relation to pooled funds. That relates specifically to the provincial Unit Trust Pool but its general principles may be of interest to charges who have their own investment portfolios, if not held in the Unit Trust Pool.

Ecumenical matters: the Synod agreed the St Andrew Declaration incorporating a commitment on the part of the Scottish Episcopal Church and Church of Scotland to work together. Much of that will in practice be worked out at local level.

Climate change: considerable time was spent at Synod considering the challenge of achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2030 (called for by General Synod 2020).

10 points of guidance

How can we do this together and help each other in this task.

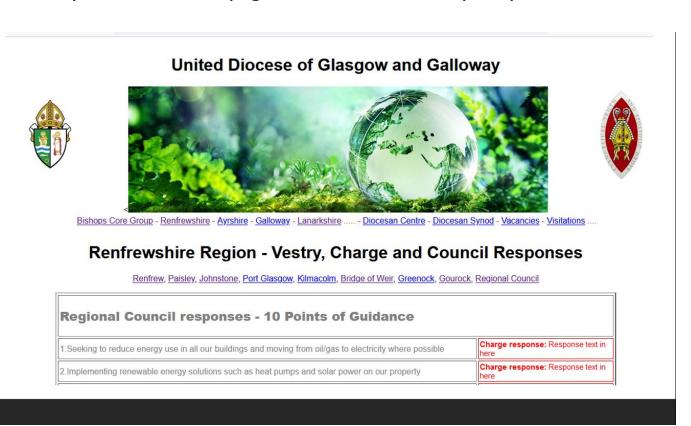
When we are asked to engage with issues that are huge, will cost us money, involve changing the way we do things, and challenge the way we are living, it is natural to argue against any ideas which might bring the change that is really needed.

Some of us live in eco-disastrous houses and work in eco-unfriendly buildings. None of that matters for us to **begin** - we are starting a journey towards the goals of 2030.

We don't know the way and we don't know how our entire political and cultural horizons may shift over the coming decade. The Province has asked us as a Diocese to engage with this matter at all levels. In the Diocesan Office we shall be considering what can be done in response to the *10 Points of Guidance*, in our work the Bishop and Dean and other

Diocesan staff will be responding too and making a plan for our engagement with the issues.

At the Regional and Charge levels we are asking for responses too, and in individual Charges you may like to ask members to work on their own, individual, household or family responses as members of the wider community and as faithful pilgrims in the Scottish Episcopal Church.



I am working on an idea (for our greater discussion at a later date) that on our Diocesan website we have pages dedicated to our entire diocesan engagement with the issues being raised for us. Over the coming years these will doubtless develop further, but as a starting point we are asking each Charge, Regional Council, and Diocesan Office holder and member of staff to contribute from their position and setting – where you are now.

We are seeking advice, help and guidance on what we be appropriate for our site.
5.Using Fair Trade, environment-and animal-friendly products wherever possible	Charge response: July 2021 The Vestry has committed to move to environment-and animal-friendly products be end of 2022 and we are going to engage our congregations in the changes we make in looking after our building, also aim to promote this to our hall user groups and ask them to join in the work as well.
6.Reducing waste by composting and recycling as much of it as possible	Charge response: July 2021 We currently recycle our paper and plastic waste. We aim to reduce the amount be encouraging the use of reading online our newsletters and leaflets etc. We want to install a compost bin on the sand will seek guidance in doing this.
7.Reducing paper usage (and then only using recycled paper)	Charge response: July 2021 As a result of the General Synod call to action we are immediately committing to u only recycled paper on site. We aim to irradicate the use of single use service sheets after the pandemic restrict

We commit to have 50% of Vestry meetings on for the next 2 years as an experimental period to see how we get on.
9.Disseminating information on good	Charge response: July 2021 We are aware of the amount of work that has been done in bringing this subject to General Synod and we want to play our part in helping to disseminate the information to as many people as we c

You see before you an example which I have invented *(my Charges still have to begin the discussions at Vestry levels in an organized way).* What would be the responses of your vestry?

Your entries to each of the 10 points would be sent in, to be added to our Diocesan website so that we can share the ideas that we are having around the challenges we have been asked to engage with.

We may find great suggestions from other Charges that we want to find out more about, or we may find that there is another Charge having the same problems as us and decide to meet up and share a way forward. Who knows what this may bring?

But what it does bring is the common and shared journey which the entire Province is asking and calling us to join in with as we look to the goal of the Action plan on Climate Change to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2030

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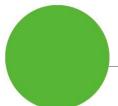
