Psalm 139, verses 1-12, 23-24

You search me, God, and you know me;

- A You know my resting and my rising; you discern my thoughts from afar.
- B You are familiar with all my ways –
 where I go, what I do –
 and you know every word before I say it.

- A Your presence is all around me; you lay your hand upon me.
- B Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is beyond my understanding.

You search me, God, and you know me;

- A Is there anywhere I could I go where you were not there before me?
- B If I climb up to heaven, you are there; if I bed down in hell, there I meet you.
- A If I took the wings of the morning and lived beyond the horizon, even there your hand would find me, your right hand would hold me fast.
- B If I asked the darkness to cover me and the daylight turned to night, the darkness would not be dark to you; night would be bright as day.

Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my thoughts. Prevent me from doing what offends you, and lead me in the everlasting way.

READINGS

Micah 6.6-8 What God Requires

'With what shall I come before the LORD, and bow myself before God on high?

Luke 4.14-21 Bringing good news to the poor

Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free,
to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.' And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.
